BOC hits HIGHEST recorded monthly collection

Amid the restrictions brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic and its effects to the overall trade environment, the Bureau of Customs (BOC) makes history by posting its highest monthly collection recorded to date.

On September 2021, the BOC collected a total revenue of P59.9 Billion, the highest in history, against its target of P56.9 Billion reflecting a 105.3% collection efficiency or a surplus of P3.0 Billion. While on October 2021, the BOC was able to collect P55.99 Billion revenue against its collection target of P57.637 billion reflecting a 97.14% collection efficiency.

As of date, the BOC collects P528 Billion since January reflecting 86% of the 2021 target collection of P616.749 Billion.

BOC's positive revenue collection performance is attributed to the improved valuation and intensified collection efforts of all the ports, improvement of importation volume and the government's effort in ensuring unhampered movement of goods domestically and internationally considering the pandemic situation.

Commissioner Rey Leonardo Guerrero commended the collective efforts of the men and women of BOC who, despite the risk to their health and safety, showed their unwavering commitment and dedication to service.

BOC collects Php497M-additional revenues in Q3 2021 from Post Clearance Audit

In its bid to collect additional lawful revenues, the Bureau of Customs continues to intensify its post clearance audit functions through the Post Clearance Audit Group (PCAG).

In its 3rd Quarter 2021 report, the PCAG highlighted its successful collection of additional revenues of Php 497,044,083.84 from July to September 2021, as part of the 112 Audit Notice Letters (ANL) issued during the period. Year to date, the PCAG has managed to collect total revenues of Php 1,037,604,985.85 from the 266 ANLs issued in 2021.

The PCAG remains optimistic in the collection of additional revenues from its post clearance audit activities noting that, at present, there are 57 demand letters amounting to Php 11.473 Billion which have become final and executory for the failure of the audited importers to contest the same. These have been referred to the BOC Legal Service for filing of the necessary collection suit.

BOC Collects P134M From 3rd Quarter Disposition Of Overstaying Containers

The Assessment and Operations Coordinating Group (AOCG), the Auction and Cargo Disposal Monitoring Division (ACDD) and the ACDD units of all BOC Collection Districts nationwide, disposed a total of 814 overstaying containers through auction, condemnation for the 3rd quarter of 2021.

In accordance with the BOC's mandates for revenue collection, border protection, and enforcement, the Bureau collected an aggregate value of Php134,643,698 from public auction of 336 containers of assorted items. 35 containers of twine, yarn droppings, muslim books, medical supplies, broadcasting equipment, among others, were donated to various agencies ang local government units while 443 containers of used clothing, rotten foodstuff, used oil, used furniture, among others, were condemned, disposing a total of 814 containers from July 2021 to September 2021.

These overstaying containers, which were abandoned and/or seized, were disposed of in accordance with Sections 1139 and 1141 of the Customs Modernization and Tariff Act (CMTA), which provide for the conditions and modes of disposition, respectively.



DOF Awards Certificate of Recognition to BOC and 9 Regulatory Agencies for TRADENET Onboarding

The Bureau of Customs was recently awarded a Certificate of Recognition from Department of Finance Undersecretary and National Single Window - Steering Committee (NSWSC) Alternate Chairperson Gil S. Beltran to acknowledge the successful onboarding of the electronic Certificate of Origin (e-CO) in the TRADENET.gov.ph platform. The Certificate was presented during the 3rd National Single Window -Technical Working Group (NSW-TWG) Virtual Meeting held on 31 August 2021.

The issuance of the electronic Certificate of Origins (e-COs) using the TRADENET.gov.ph platform is being implemented in all ports and subports of entry in compliance with Customs Memorandum Order No. CMO 15-2019. All e-COs issued by the system are automatically transmitted to ASEAN through the ASEAN Single Window (ASW) System.

During the Virtual Awarding Ceremony, nine (9) Trade Regulatory Government Agencies (TRGAs) were also given recognition for their successful onboarding in the new NSW system. These TRGAs include: Biodiversity Management Bureau (BMB), National Tobacco Administration (NTA), Philippine Drug Enforcement Agency (PDEA), Bureau of Agriculture and Fisheries Standards (BAFS), Fertilizer and Pesticide Authority (FPA), Sugar Regulatory Administration (SRA), DTI - Export Marketing Bureau (DTI-EMB), Optical Media Board (OMB), National Meat Inspection Service (NMIS).

The BOC, together with DOF and the Anti-Red Tape Authority (ARTA), aims to onboard at least 18 TRGAs in the new NSW System this year.



BOC Port of Manila Prepares for Voyage of First Philippine Flag Containerized Vessel to US

In preparation for the voyage of the first-ever Philippine Flag Containerized Vessel to the United States, the Bureau of Customs Port of Manila (POM) met with the key officials of Iris Logistics, Inc., a subsidiary of the Royal Cargo, Inc., on September 14, 2021, through virtual conference.

Iris Logistics, Inc. and Royal Cargo, Inc. paid a courtesy call to District Collector Michael Angelo Vargas and other POM key officials via Zoom Teleconference to introduce the Iris Shipping Line.

During the said meeting, Capt. Igal Dafni of Iris Logistics requested assistance from the Philippine Customs, particularly the Port of Manila in the seamless interface between BOC POM and PH M/V Iris Paoay to the United States. The said shipping vessel has 1,118 TEU capacity.

District Collector Michael Angelo Vargas assured the smooth passage of the First Philippine Flag Containerized Vessel that will carry export and import laiden containers to and from the US. Moreover, Mark Khambatta, COO of Iris Logistics, Inc. mentioned that the ship company chose the Port of Manila because they are confident that the port demonstrates the ability to consistently provide services that meet customer satisfaction.

BOC Clears 106 MILLION Doses of COVID-19 Vaccines

From February to October 2021, the Bureau of Customs (BOC) cleared 106, 245, 420 doses of COVID-19 vaccines in a total of 167 shipments. Among these, 102, 817, 320 doses were released from the Port of NAIA, 2,433, 600 doses were processed by Sub-port of Mactan while 994,500 doses were processed by Port of Davage

The vaccine doses consist of eight brands which include approximately 44.50M doses of Sinovac, 30.39M doses of Pfizer-BioNTech, 15.31M doses of AstraZeneca, 10.01M doses of Moderna, 3.24M doses of Johnson & Johnson, 1M doses of Sinopharm, 1.69M doses of Sputnik V, and 100k doses of Hayat-Vax.

Under the leadership of Commissioner Rey Leonardo B. Guerrero, the BOC commits to expeditiously facilitate the processing and release of COVID-19 vaccine shipments to support the Philippine government's vaccination program amidst the ongoing pandemic.

The Bureau of Customs (BOC) passed the 3rd Stage of the Performance Governance System (PGS) "Proficiency Stage" and once again received the Gold Governance Trailblazer award, the highest PGS award during the Public Governance Forum – BOC Proficiency Revalida via Zoom Conference on September 03, 2021.

Last 2019, the Bureau of Customs led by Commissioner Rey Leonardo B. Guerrero enrolled to the 4-Stage Performance Governance System (PGS) of the Institute for Solidarity in Asia (ISA). In 2019 and 2020, respectively, the Bureau of Customs consecutively bagged the Gold Governance Trailblazer awards as it passed the 1st Stage "Initiation Stage" and the 2nd Stage "Compliance Stage" of the Performance Governance System.

During the Proficiency Revalida organized by the Institute for Solidarity in Asia (ISA), Commissioner Guerrero presented the BOC's accomplishments and breakthrough results yielded from the sustained momentum of the implementation of its programs and innovations initiated during the early stages of its PGS journey.

These programs are anchored on the modernization of its processes and values reformation of its people. These include automation of 108 out of 148 BOC Core Processes; full utilization of 17 Customer Centers nationwide; launching of the National Customs Enforcement Network and Customs Operations Center, to name a few. For its bid of values reformation of its people, the Values Transformation Program, digitized IPCR and Personal Scorecard are in place.

These innovations are inclined with the BOC Strategic Communications Plan of automation and modernization, good governance, and values transformation.

BOC-XIP Improves Its Customs Operational Performance In 2021

As the Bureau of Custom's (BOC) intensifies its operational performance through enhanced trade facilitation, improved revenue collection, and strengthened border protection, the X-ray Inspection Project (XIP) continues to generate significant contributions to the performance of the Bureau under its mandate for the year 2021.

In 2020, the BOC had a total of 356,187 scanned containers from January to September. Meanwhile in 2021, the BOC now has a total of 603,561 scanned containers under the same timeline, boosting its scanning rate by +69.45% compared to last year's performance.

With the utilization of 124 x-ray machines, the BOC-XIP was able to collect Php63,426,370.64 additional duties and taxes from January to September 2021. Moreover, four (4) brand new units of x-ray machines are currently being assembled at the Port of Manila which will be of aid in the continuous improvement of the Bureau's performance.

Furthermore, the BOC-XIP also facilitated the apprehension of various smuggled commodities and illegal drugs with a street value of Php117,393,900.00.



Customs Creates BOC-PACC Command Group, Anti-Corruption Coordinating Committees







The Bureau of Customs (BOC), together with the Presidential Anti-Corruption Coordinating Commission (PACC) headed by Chairman Greco Belgica, formally launched the BOC-PACC Command Group and the BOC's Anti-Corruption Committees on 7 October 2021.

The BOC-PACC Command Group, headed by Assistant Commissioner Vincent Philip Maronilla, includes Customs representatives and members who shall oversee the anti-corruption campaign within the Bureau, aligned with the PACC's Project Kasangga. The initiative serves as a holistic way of stamping out corruption, which complements the task force of the Department of Justice, and national government.

Under the BOC-PACC Command Group are the Anti-Corruption Coordinating Committees (ACCC) in the various Collection Districts of the Bureau that shall provide support and ensure coordination at the district level. The District Collector shall serve as the ACCC's Chairperson, the Deputy Collectors for Administration as Vice-Chairperson, and the Chiefs of Law Division, ESS District Commanders, and CIIS Field Station Chiefs as committee members.

The Command Group, with the support of ACCCs, shall coordinate with the PACC the full implementation of Project Kasangga and other projects or initiatives of the Commission. They are also mandated to facilitate all requests for documents or information in connection with any investigation being conducted by the PACC, under existing rules and regulations. The Command Group, together with the ACCCs, may also recommend policies and actions in ensuring public accountability and good governance. Moreover, updates and reports relative to Project Kasangga shall be submitted to the Commissioner.

Seven BOC Offices are now ISO 9001:2015 Certified

Currently, seven (7) ports and offices have successfully passed the ISO 9001:2015 Quality Management System (QMS) Certification, while the rest are in various stages of compliance.

The Port of Batangas was re-awarded with ISO 9001:2015 QMS Certification after passing the second Surveillance Audit last April 30, 2021, with its expanded scope, which includes the processes of Customer Care Center (CCC). The Port of Batangas has undergone and passed annual surveillance audits since it started its ISO certification journey in 2013.

The Ports of Manila, Clark, and NAIA also passed the ISO 9001:2015 Certification on June 16, August 5, and October 6 respectively. Furthermore, Subport of Mactan and Subport of Dumaguete were also awarded the certificate for ISO 9001:2015 QMS on May 21 and September 3, respectively. The CCC Port of Manila also fulfilled the requirements for the first surveillance for their ISO 9001:2015 QMS on August 6.

Four (4) more BOC offices are expected to be certified with ISO 9001:2015 QMS before the year ends. These are the Port of Davao, Subport of Iligan, CCC – Limay, and CCC-Subic.



SOF Inspects 1st of 20 Fast Patrol Boats Procured By BOC

As part of the Bureau of Customs (BOC) commitment to enhancing border security measures, the Bureau through the Enforcement and Security Service Water Patrol Division (ESS-WPD) facilitated the inspection of the first of its newly acquired water assets on Sept. 20, 2021.

The inspection was conducted by Department of Finance Secretary Carlos G. Dominguez and BOC Commissioner Rey Leonardo B. Guerrero. Deputy Commissioner for Internal Administration Group Donato B. San Juan and Enforcement Group Deputy Commissioner Teddy S. Raval were also present.




The vessels are composed of 20 units of 12.7-meter boats equipped with three engines capable of doing over 45 knots top speed. The boats will be used in boarding formalities, patrol, and water pursuits within the nation's borders.

CIIS-POM Seize Php 150 Million Worth of Luxury Cars And Coins In Quezon City

As part of the Bureau of Customs' (BOC) drive against smuggling, the Bureau of Customs Port of Manila (BOC-POM) through the Port's Customs Intelligence and Investigation Service Field Office (CIIS) seized millions worth of luxury vehicles and coins in an operation conducted in Quezon City on October 01, 2021.

Armed with a Letter of Authority (LOA) issued by BOC Commissioner Rey Leonardo B. Guerrero, members of POM-CIIS, Philippine Coast Guard (PCG), Banko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP) and the National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) inspected the warehouse located in Scout Tuazon, Quezon City.

The inspection led to the discovery of possible smuggled



Further investigation is underway for possible violation of Section 1114 of RA 10863 also known as the Customs Mordernization and Tariff Act (CMTA), BSP rules and regulation as well as Anti-Money Laundering Laws.



BOC Cagayan De Oro shreds 30M Worth of Illicit Cigarettes

The Bureau of Customs Port of Cagayan de Oro, led by District Collector Atty. Elvira Cruz, destroyed illicit cigarettes worth 30 million pesos inside Digama Warehouse and Destruction Facility in Barangay Bayabas, Cagayan de Oro, on September 8, 2021.

The 977 master cases of cigarettes or 48,850 reams consigned to a certain Lorna Oftana from General Santos, City were destroyed using a shredder equipment. The shipment was apprehended based on the received derogatory information being misdeclared as personal effects upon arrival at Mindanao Container Terminal in Tagoloan, Misamis Oriental last May 20, 2021. Consequently, a case for violation of RA 10863 otherwise known as Customs Modernization and Tariff Act (CMTA) in relation to Section 1400 (Misdeclaration) was already filed against the consignee.

Port of Cebu Seizes Over Php2 Million Worth of "Ukay-Ukay"

The Port of Cebu seized on September 7, 288 Bales of Used Clothing or "Ukay-Ukay" from Korea with estimated street value of Php2.3 million. Acting upon a reliable intelligence information, the Port's Customs Intelligence and Investigation Service (CIIS) requested the issuance of a Pre-Lodgement Control Order (PLCO) against the shipment for suspicion that it contains "ukay-ukay"—a prohibited article.

A 100% physical examination immediately followed the issuance of the PLCO by Acting District Collector Charlito Martin R. Mendoza. The examination was conducted by the assigned Customs Examiner with the representatives from the CIIS, ESS, PCG, PDEA, and CCBI-Cebu Chapter. After confirmation that the shipment indeed contains "ukay-ukay", District Collector Mendoza immediately issued a Warrant of Seizure and Detention against the shipment based on Section 1113 (F) in relation to Section 118 (G) of the Customs Modernization and Tariff Act, and Republic Act No. 4653. Last July, the Port also seized a shipment of "ukay-ukay" from Thailand worth Php4.5 Million.









Inter-agency Operation Seizes 264M Worth of Shabu

On October 18, 2021, a composite team of the Philippine Drug Enforcement Agency (PDEA), Customs Intelligence and Investigation Service (CIIS) of BOC Manila International Container Port (MICP), Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) Task Force Noah, NOLCOM, National Intelligence Coordinating Agency (NICA), and Philippine National Police (PNP) managed a buy-bust operation in Angeles City, Pampanga resulting to the seizure of approximately 38 kilos of suspected shabu with a street value of PHP262.20 million.

The follow-up operation led by PDEA was in connection with another buybust operation conducted on October 16 at Dasmarinas, Cavite resulting in the seizure of approximately 240 kilos of shabu estimated to be worth Php1.656 billion and the arrest of two individuals.

The encounter in Angeles City resulted in the discovery of approximately 38 kilos of suspected shabu with a value of P262,200,200. Other pieces of evidence found were four pcs Caliber .45 pistols, two pieces Iphone cellphone, 1 piece weighing scale with charger, four pieces genuine one-thousand-peso bill, on top of boodle money, and I box of Ziplock Transparent Plastic.

The said seizure is under Sections 119 and 1113 of the Customs Modernization and Tariff Act concerning RA 9165 or the Comprehensive Dangerous Drugs Act of 2002.

From Page 1 BOC-IG recorded estimated value of 545.06 million of seized smuggled agricultural products. In terms of value, the following are the top three commodities: (1) rice amounting to 206.80 million (2) onions amounting to 190.48 million, and (3) garlic amounting to Php 55 million.

On cases filed, data from the Bureau's Action Team Against Smugglers (BATAS) of the Legal Service show that 14 criminal cases involving 41 individuals and customs brokers were filed before the Department of Justice for the unlawful importation of agricultural products valued at around Php 85.2 million.In addition, 10 administrative cases before the Professional Regulation Commission were filed against customs brokers involved in the said unlawful acts.

In terms of accreditation, two BOC registered importers were revoked of their accreditation while 23 were suspended due to issuance of Warrant of Seizure and Detention against their shipments of agricultural products.

The BOC and the DA also agreed to having an inter-agency data exchange of all relevant information requested by the DA to validate shipments suspected of agricultural smuggling. The said information includes the Sanitary and Phytosanitary Import Clearance (SPSIC), among others. This is on top of the Inward Foreign Manifest that the BOC has been furnishing the DA consistently.

Also, an agreement towards a strengthened anti-smuggling coordination was established where derogatory information and intelligence information may be quickly shared and acted upon by each agency. This effort shall be jointly supervised by DA Assistant Secretary for Economic Intelligence Federico Laciste and BOC Deputy Commissioner for Intelligence Group Raniel

Furthermore, a Technical Working Group (TWG) was created to review and update the regulations and procedures for clearing imported agricultural commodities. The TWG is also tasked to identify and address all possible loopholes in the importation guidelines and procedures. The TWG comprises Agriculture Assistant Secretary for Regulations Liza Battad as the Chairperson and BOC Assistant Commissioner Vincent Maronilla as the Co-Chairperson. Meanwhile, the BOC is ready for the influx of imported fish in the coming days as the country grapples to sustain the supply and lower the price of fish in the market.
