- This refers to the letter from Kunio Mikuriya, WCO Secretary General, World Customs Organization (WCO) inviting developing-country members to the Master's Degree Programme in Public Finance at the National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies (GRIPS) in Tokyo, Japan from September 2023 to September 2024.
- 2.0 The major objective of the Public Finance Program is to provide students with the conceptual understanding and technical competence to become leaders in the area of taxation and Customs. The curriculum is designed for government officials from developing countries, who currently work in Customs or tax administration. The program is a 13-month course comprised of two segments: an academic segment common to Customs and tax students, and a practicum segment common to Customs and tax depending on the student's stream/concentration.
- 3.0 The academic segment provides rigorous, economics-oriented training aimed at developing a broad understanding of the theoretical, empirical and institutional aspects of Customs policy implementation and administration. The practical segment is taught in co-operation with Japan Customs, including the Japan Customs Training Institute, pursuing acquirement of enough knowledge and Customs practices applying for their home administration for further improvement of Customs procedures and modernization.
- 4.0 The Japan-WCO Human Resource Development Programme Scholarship Programme provides a grant covering travel, subsistence, admission, tuition and other approved expenses to enable promising young Customs managers from developing countries to undertake Master's level studies at the GRIPS.
- 5.0 Interested candidates/applicants should meet the following conditions for selection:
  - a. The candidates **should be in good health** to productively pursue studies in Japan, **preferably below 35 years of age** as of April 1, 2023;

- Individuals who have already been awarded a scholarship under the Japan-WCO Human Resource Development Programme in the past will not be entitled to apply for this scholarship programme;
- C. Candidates should be Customs officers fully proficient in English (Applicants are required to submit an official report of their TOEFL iBT or IELTS score. Admission priority will be given to applicants who have a TOEFL iBT score of 79 or higher, or an IELTS Academic score of 6.0 or higher.) Applicants who have completed or expect to complete an undergraduate or graduate degree institution located in the United States, the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, or Ireland will be automatically exempted from submitting an English test score. Applicants who have completed or expect to complete an undergraduate or graduate degree at an institution where the language of instruction is English may request a waiver of the English language proficiency requirement;
- d. Should have a bachelor's degree or its equivalent;
- e. Should have **at least two-year work experience in Customs field** as of September 1, 2022 and should have assessed potential for advancement;
- f. After the completion of the programme, the candidates should continue to work in their home Customs administration for 3 years at least. For monitoring purposes, they are kindly requested to inform the GRIPS and the WCO beforehand, in the event that they plan to leave their home Customs administrations.
- g. The candidates will be selected by the WCO in consultation with the GRIPS;
- h. In accepting a Scholarship, the candidate:
  - i. Must fill out and submit Scholar guidelines to WCO;
  - ii. Undertakes to work full time on the assigned programme. It will not be possible to undertake other activities not related programme;
  - iii. Undertakes to comply with the laws and show due respect to the culture and life of the host country.
- 6.0 As per Customs Memorandum Order No. 13-2020 "Policies and Guidelines for the Availment of Scholarship Programs of the Bureau of Customs Personnel," the following additional requirements shall be imposed upon nominees for scholarship programs:
  - a. Must hold a permanent position and have rendered at least two (2) years of continuous service as permanent employees in the Bureau;
  - b. Have at least Very Satisfactory performance ratings for the last two (2) consecutive rating periods preceding the period of application for scholarship program;
  - c. Have no foreign or local scholarship grant in the past two (2) years;
  - d. Have no pending service obligation from previous local or foreign scholarship; and
  - e. Have no pending criminal and/or administrative case.

- 7.0 Interested applicants must submit the following to the Interim Training and Development Division (ITDD) on or before January 24, 2023 for evaluation of who will be nominated by the Commissioner:
  - Duly signed Endorsement/Recommendation Letter with justification from the Deputy Commissioner, for personnel assigned under Groups, or from the District Collector, for personnel assigned in Collection Districts;
  - b. Duly accomplished Personal Data Sheet with Work Experience Sheet (Civil Service Commission Form No. 212);
  - c. Individual Performance and Commitment Review Form for the last two (2) consecutive rating periods;
  - d. Certification from the ITDD stating that the personnel has no (1) foreign or local scholarship grant in the past two (2) years; and (2) pending service obligation from previous local and foreign scholarship;
  - e. Legal Clearance and notarized Affidavit of No Pending Criminal and/or Administrative Case;
  - f. Printed accomplished GRIPS Application Form (see attached forms attached to this memorandum);
  - g. Official transcripts of academic record and graduation/degree certificates issued by the university and bearing the seal or signature of the registrar;
  - Official evidence of English ability. One of the following test scores is required: 1. TOEFL iBT: 79 or higher 2. IELTS Academic: 6.0 or higher. In lieu of TOEFL and IELTS, a waiver of the English language proficiency requirement;
  - Two (2) letters of recommendation written by faculty members or job supervisors who are familiar with the applicant's academic and/or professional abilities using the designated form; and
  - j. Certificate of employment using the designated form.
- 8.0 All complete set of documents that will be received from the applicants will be consolidated for submission to the Admissions Office of GRIPS by post.

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS**

#### Introduction

- The major objective of the Japan-WCO Human Resource Development Programme is to
  provide scholars with the conceptual understanding and technical competence required of
  leaders who lead organizations in the area of taxation and Customs. Scholars are expected to
  return to home Customs in order to utilize their knowledge and skills acquired through the
  programme and disseminate them to home Customs administrations.
- The Japan-WCO Human Resource Development Programme (Scholarship Programme)
  provides a grant covering travel, subsistence, admission, tuition and other approved expenses
  to enable promising young Customs managers from developing countries to undertake
  Master's level studies at the National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies (GRIPS) in Tokyo,
  Japan.
- The following administrative provisions govern this Scholarship Programme. If a nominee or a
  concerned person in the nominating administration has any questions, they should address
  them to the Capacity Building Directorate of the WCO Secretariat before the Scholarship is
  accepted.

#### Conditions of candidacy and selection

- The candidates should be in good health to productively pursue studies in Japan, preferably below 35 years of age as of 1 April 2023.
- The recipients of scholarships under this Programme will enrol for a Master's degree in the Public Finance Program at the GRIPS.
- This Scholarship is for 13 months academic year starting from September. The Scholarship period cannot be extended.
- Individuals who have already been awarded a scholarship under the Japan-WCO Human Resource Development Programme in the past will not be entitled to apply for this Scholarship Programme.
- 8. Candidates should be Customs officers fully proficient in English (Applicants are required to submit an official report of their TOEFL iBT or IELTS score. Admission priority will be given to applicants who have a TOEFL iBT score of 79 or higher, or an IELTS Academic score of 6.0 or higher.) Applicants who have completed or expect to complete an undergraduate or graduate



degree at an accredited institution located in the United States, the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, or Ireland will be automatically exempted from submitting an English test score. Applicants who have completed or expect to complete an undergraduate or a graduate degree at an institution where the language of instruction is English may request a waiver of the English language proficiency requirement. They should have a bachelor's degree or its equivalent. They should have at least **two-year work experience** in Customs field as of 1 September 2022, and should have assessed potential for advancement.

- 9. The candidates should be eligible to participate in this Programme according to the rules and regulations of the home administration and relevant authorities.
- 10. After the completion of the Programme, the candidates should continue to work in their home Customs administration for 3 years at least. For monitoring purposes, they are kindly requested to inform the GRIPS and the WCO beforehand, in the event that they plan to leave their home Customs administrations.
- 11. The candidates will be selected by the WCO in consultation with the GRIPS. The GRIPS shall inform the candidates about their selection or otherwise. The WCO will send an appropriate congratulatory letter to the home administration.
- 12. In accepting a Scholarship, the candidate:
  - Must fill out and submit Scholar Guidelines to WCO, which will be shared later.
  - Undertakes to work full time on the assigned Programme. It will not be possible to undertake other activities not related to the Programme.
  - Undertakes to comply with the laws and show due respect to the culture and life of the host country.
- 13. The application process for candidates is as follows:

- 15. A duplicate set will be made and forwarded to the WCO Secretariat by the GRIPS Admissions Office. Therefore, it is not necessary to send the duplicate set to the WCO Secretariat.
- 16. Please note that applications received after the deadlines will not be considered.

#### **FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS**

#### Accommodation and living allowance

- 17. An all-inclusive allowance of about 147,000 Japanese Yen per month will be granted to cover the cost of accommodation, meals and incidental expenses for the study period. The amount of the allowance is subject to change according to the decision of the Japanese Government. (The allowance will be paid in Japanese Yen.)
- 18. The Scholars will be offered assistance by the GRIPS to find residential accommodation at reasonable rent.
- 19. The Scholars should note that the allowance will not be sufficient to cover the expenses of any accompanying dependants. No family-related expenses will be paid or added to the monthly living allowance.

#### **Other**

- If costs are incurred by failure in following application rules, such as late notification of nonacceptance, the WCO will charge the costs to candidates or to the organization to which the candidates belong.
- 21. If the WCO is informed by the GRIPS that a Scholar is unable to complete the course in accordance with the standard terms due, for example, to poor academic performance or suspension, the Scholarship may be terminated even during the academic year.

#### TRAVEL ARRANGEMENTS

#### Travel costs

- 22. The cost of travel (return trip) between the Scholar's place of residence and Tokyo will be borne by the Programme budget. For this purpose, an economy class pre-paid air ticket by the shortest and the most economical route will be provided to the selected candidate. Transportation costs between the Scholar's place of residence and departure/arrival airport should be borne by the Scholars.
- 23. Any additional costs entailed with the changes of the pre-arranged itineraries or cancellation of the flight without reasonable grounds after the issuance of the e-ticket should be borne by the Scholar or their home administration.

#### Insurance

24. No insurance coverage is provided by the WCO/Japan in respect of personal accidents or damage to or loss of personal effects during transport to or from Tokyo.



#### Passports - Visas

25. Persons entering Japan must hold a valid Passport and Visa. Vaccination requirements depend upon nationality, and the Scholar is personally responsible for complying with them. The GRIPS will provide the selected candidates with a letter certifying enrolment in the Japan-WCO Scholarship in order that they may apply to the Japanese Embassy in their home country for a <u>student visa</u>, authorizing temporary residence in Japan for the duration of the Programme.

#### **Health Certificate**

26. The Scholars selected will have to undergo a comprehensive medical examination and submit a certificate from a licensed physician <u>certifying that they are free from any medical</u> <u>condition that would impair their studies during the Programme.</u>

#### **COMPLETION OF PROGRAMME**

- 27. Scholars are expected to complete the Programme as scheduled. Early repatriation may be authorized only on medical grounds or for other similarly important reasons. If a Scholar withdraws from the Programme before the commencement of the Programme or before its scheduled completion, he/she shall not be entitled to any benefits from the date of the decision. The WCO may request for refund of any expenses that are incurred from their withdrawal to the Scholar. In case refund is requested, if the scholar cannot afford this for any reason, the organization to which the Scholar belongs should undertake the obligation.
- 28. On completion of the Programme, the Scholar is required to go back to their home country without delay. In the event of no return, the WCO may request for refund of the scholarship to the Scholar or to the Organization to where the Scholar belongs. The WCO/Japan will pay travel costs, as described above, for the Scholar's return journey from Tokyo to the point of first departure. Entitlement to return travel expenses shall cease if the Scholar does not leave Tokyo within two weeks of completion of the Programme, unless they have any compelling reason for extending their stay.
- 29. In the event of a Scholar's failing to complete the Programme, a request of partial refund may be sent to the Scholar. In case refund is requested, if the scholar cannot afford this for any reason, the organization to which the Scholar belongs should undertake the obligation.
- 30. After half a year and 3 years respectively from completion of the Programme, Scholars should report to the WCO and the GRIPS indicating the post they occupy in their home administration and how they have been utilizing the experience they acquired in Japan.

If your program does not require a thesis, you can submit a paper that you wrote during your study and that is related to your area of research.

If you are currently a student, you can submit the thesis you have been working on even if it is incomplete. If you think it is not enough, you can also submit a term paper or some other paper related to your research.

Applicants to the five-year Ph.D. program (PA) who do not have a graduate degree must submit an undergraduate thesis or a course paper.

## 4. After You Apply

#### Notify GRIPS of any changes

You must notify GRIPS by e-mail as soon as possible of any changes in your personal data (e.g. address, phone number) or in your employment information (e.g., promotion, transfer) that may occur after you have completed your application.

#### Admissions results

Once we have received your complete application with supporting documents, it is sent to our screening committee.

The final results of screening are announced by e-mail (See Admissions Schedule). Both successful and unsuccessful applicants receive notification e-mails.

## Program Description Public Finance Program (Customs Course)

#### **Overview and Program Objectives**

Since 2000, the Customs Course at GRIPS (as part of the Public Finance Master's Degree program) has cultivated promising customs officials. The major objective of the Public Finance Program is to provide students with the conceptual understanding and technical competence to become leaders in the area of taxation and customs. The curriculum is designed for government officials from developing countries, who currently work in customs or tax administration. The program is a 13-month course comprised of two segments: an academic segment common to customs and tax students, and a practicum segment that is conducted separately for customs and tax depending on the student's stream/concentration.

#### **Academic Segment**

The academic segment provides a rigorous economics-oriented education aimed at developing a broad understanding of the theoretical, empirical, and institutional aspects of customs/tax policy implementation and administration, in the context of developing countries economic and social development. The academic segment culminates in the writing of a master's thesis facilitated by a course in which students develop their thesis with the input of academic supervisors and their peers, in which they have several opportunities to present their research.

#### **Practicum Segment**

The practicum segment of the Customs Course is provided in collaboration with Japan's Customs Training Institute (CTI: WCO Regional Training Centre), the Ministry of Finance. It

involves workshops and seminars by Japan Customs experts, and field trips to regional Customs. These experiences give students opportunities to enhance their learning on practical, administrative, legal, and institutional issues, thus integrating practical experience with their theoretical learning.





#### **Outline of the Curriculum**

#### September Program

One academic year at GRIPS is composed of four terms: fall (16 weeks), winter (8 weeks), spring (16 weeks), and summer (8 weeks). Although the formal academic term starts in October, students in the Customs Course are invited to arrive in early September, and attend supplementary classes to brush up on their basic mathematical and statistical skills, which will help them grasp the micro-foundations of economics and the basis for empirical analysis. They also attend classes on basic Japanese, and special five-day program as part of the practicum in Customs Administration.

#### Formal Academic Program

The formal academic segment of the master's program begins in October. It starts with focused teaching of foundational skills in micro- and macroeconomics as well as quantitative analysis. It then moves to a range of applied topics which help students understand how to design, implement, and evaluate public policies -- customs policy in particular -- in accordance with development strategies. Topics include public finance, international economics, development economics, human resource management, customs laws, and tax laws. See the list of course offerings and the flow chart for the 2022-2023 on the following pages.


In addition to the required and strongly recommended elective courses, students can choose freely throughout the year from any of the extensive list of courses offered at GRIPS. Along with economics courses, GRIPS also offers numerous courses in various academic areas that are conducted in English. These range from public administration, political science, international relations, mathematical science, data science, and social engineering, to a diverse range of interdisciplinary fields. Students can also choose to enroll in the Japanese language courses offered throughout the year at various levels of proficiency, although credits earned in these courses cannot count towards the degree.

#### **Practicum Program**

Practicum segment comprises Practicum in Customs Administration (PCA) I, II, III and Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) Enforcement at the Border as required courses and Customs Law (CL) as an elective. Among these, PCA I to III are interrelated and mutually complementary courses, whereby PCA I focus on the WTO and Customs-related trade rules, PCA II focus on the standards and good practices developed in the WCO and PCA III provide necessary knowledge of Customs reform and modernization building on the preceding courses and focus on how international rules and norms are being implemented in Japan Customs. CL will be focusing on how the multilateral trading system based on the GATT and the WTO evolved over the years and its implications on Customs administration. The segment begins in October with PCA I and subsequent courses will involve on-site visits to regional Customs in collaboration with the instructors at the CTI.

#### Master's Thesis

There is one required course, Thesis Seminar, that students must enroll from fall through summer term, which are devoted to producing the master's thesis (or "policy paper") on a topic related to public finance. In this course, students are provided with personal instruction in an intimate environment by a faculty advisor, and several opportunities to present both their ongoing and completed research papers. Students are supported in the writing process by mandatory Policy Proposal Writing and Thesis and Policy Proposal Writing courses, as well as through individual consultation with faculty members of the GRIPS Center for Professional Communication.



#### **Degree Requirements**

- •The curriculum is comprised of two course categories: required courses and elective courses, In the elective courses, we have identified 11 courses that are highly recommended.
- •Students in the Customs Course must complete a minimum of 34 credits, 20 of which are made up of required courses.
- •Besides the minimum credit requirements stated above, students must complete and obtain approval for a master's thesis.







### **Brief Core Course Descriptions** (Academic Segment)

#### **Public Finance I**

In this course, students will learn both expenditure side and revenue side analyses of public finance theory. Topics include impact of public debt, sustainability, public capital and growth, public goods, taxation and efficiency/income distribution, amongst others.

#### The World and the SDGs

The sustainable development goals (SDGs) adopted by the United Nations General Assembly in September 2015 present challenges that we all have to face, both globally and locally. GRIPS students are expected to play leadership roles in their respective careers, and naturally they are required to have a sophisticated understanding of the urgent but complex nature of the challenges that the SDGs present. To that end, this course, mandatory for all GRIPS students, offers an introductory overview of the state of the world in the 21st century through an examination of the historical development of the world system within the global eco-geological setting, and provides basic knowledge of the social, economic, political and ecological issues that are now being targeted by the SDGs. The world is so complex and as the SDGs cover a broad spectrum of issues, so no single course is sufficient for examination of all the important issues. However, for an understanding of the inter-related nature of the SDGs, it is useful to have a brief overview of the prospects of the SDGs and of the attendant difficulties. Throughout their participation in this course, the students are expected to think and re-think their major research focus at GRIPS within the wide perspective embodied in the SDGs.

#### Microeconomics I

This is an introductory course on microeconomics. It covers basic economic assumptions and concepts used to define behaviors of consumers and producers in the market. The course consists of three parts: consumer theory, producer theory and the equilibrium in a competitive market. In the consumer theory, preference, utility, budget constraints, utility maximization and demand curves will be introduced. In the producer theory, production and cost functions, profit maximization, and supply curves will be discussed. Finally, the concept and the determination of the equilibrium will be analyzed.

#### Microeconomics II

Based on certain understanding of materials taught in Microeconomics I, this course expands the basic framework. This course covers various market structure such as monopoly, oligopoly, and monopsony using the framework of game theory. Then course also introduces several cases where the market fails to achieve efficiency and how to address those market failures.



#### Macroeconomics I

This is a first course in the macroeconomics sequence. The course will cover broad topics relating to major macroeconomic variables; eg. money supply, inflation, unemployment, economic growth. Given that these variables can be changed over time and different across countries, we will use simple macroeconomic models to illustrate the underlying mechanism behind the change and difference. The focus of this course is on the long-run equilibrium.

#### Macroeconomics II

This is the second course in the macroeconomics sequence. It will cover broad topics, mostly related to short-run economic behavior.

#### Introduction to Applied Econometrics

This course helps students to understand applied econometric methods and to foster the skills needed to plan and execute their own empirical projects in economics. Topics include ordinary least squares estimation, panel data and fixed effects estimation, instrument variable estimation, difference-in-differences, and regression assessment. We study many examples and STATA package for actual estimation and application.

#### **Government and Market**

The objective of this course is to acquire an in-depth understanding of the economic roles of government in a modern market-based society. We seek to understand what governments should do (or should not do), what should be left to the market and to private individuals, and what would be the consequences of government policies. This course will help you to apply the principles and knowledge of microeconomics to current policy issues.

#### Fiscal Reform in Japan

The course discusses the current problems with Japan's public finance policy and the necessary reforms to address them. Japan's public finance faces several important issues such as huge government debt and rapid population aging, The course will discuss a fiscal consolidation plan, implementation of social security reform as well as medical care system and pension system.

# Reform of Economic Policy in Japan

This course covers issues related to the formulation of economic policy. The main topics discussed include the current state of the Japanese economy and its weaknesses. Japan's economy has three major weaknesses: lagging in globalization, low productivity in the service sector, and inflexibility in the labor market. Knowledge of Japan's economic structural reforms towards increased productivity and labor market reform will be useful to many Asian countries which are experiencing or will experience rapid population ageing. Also under discussion will be the role of government from the view point of economic growth.



#### **International Trade**

This course introduces the basic concepts, tools and information required for an understanding of the flow of goods across countries, i.e. international trade. We will investigate why nations trade, what they trade, and who gains from international trade. We will also analyze countries' motives for regulating international trade and the effect of regulatory policies on economic welfare.

#### **Development Economics**

This course aims to familiarize students with development problems and issues that are fundamental to developing countries.

## **Human Resources Management**

Knowledge of Human Resource Management (HRM) has become critically important for the managers of public sector organizations. By working within a framework of academic analysis and through the practical experience of the instructor, students are expected to acquire managerial expertise and a practical sense of how public sector organizations are reformed.

#### **Economics of Tax Policy**

In this course, the students will acquire an in-depth understanding of the principles of taxation and the economics tools for analysis of tax systems and policy. The overall goal of this course is that the students will be able to apply these principles and tools to work with current tax policy issues and fundamental policy reform options.

#### **Political Economy**

This course reviews the recent development in the literature on political economy, by introducing both theoretical and empirical studies on the frontier of the literature. The goal of the course is to develop students' ability to identify interesting and important questions in the related applied economic fields and to present these ideas effectively.

# **Brief Core Course Descriptions (Practicum Segment)**

#### **Customs Law**

This course will take up how the multilateral trading system based on the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) and the World Trade Organization (WTO) evolved over the years with focus on its implications on the Customs administration. The course will further elaborate on the basic principles of the multilateral trading system such as the Most Favored Nation (MFN), National Treatment (NT), relationship between WTO and Free Trade Agreements (FTAs)/Customs Unions (CUs)/ Preferential Trade Arrangements (PTAs), together with discussions on how WTO Members can use the trading system based on the WTO Agreements, including the Dispute Settlement System.

# Practicum in Customs Administration I

This course will introduce the basic principles of the multilateral trading system (MFN, NT, FTAs/CUs/PTAs, etc.) and take up Customs-related trade rules in the context of the GATT and the WTO, focusing on how these rules are developed in trade negotiations and its implications on the Customs administration especially as the implementing authority. Topics will include trade facilitation, bound rate of duty and tariff classification, customs valuation, e-commerce, etc.



## **Practicum in Customs Administration II**

Knowing about policy and role of the World Customs Organization (WCO) and its tools is essential for managing Customs administration. WCO sets strategic management and four packages, namely Revenue Package, Economic Competitiveness Package (ECP), Compliance and Enforcement Package (CEP) and Organizational Development Package (ODP) as the framework of its activities. Four packages include various tools and instruments including Risk Management Compendium, Safe Framework of Standards (SAFE FOS), Authorized Economic Operator (AEO), Time Release Study and other Performance Measurement tools and others. This course provides the background and outline of the WCO activities and its tools including how member's apply these tools effectively.

#### **Practicum in Customs Administration III**

This course aims to provide students with necessary knowledge of Customs reform and modernization, in terms of both theoretical and practical aspects, and problem-solving skills needed for strategic planning. The focus is thus placed on how a given knowledge can be applied to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of their own Customs Administrations. As generally recognized that a holistic approach is the key to successful reform and modernization, students are expected to deepen their understanding of essential components of Customs missions by referring to international standards and good practices of Japan Customs. Lectures include reviews and more practical aspects of areas which have already been taught in the Customs Law, the Practicum in Customs Administration I and II.

#### Intellectual Property Rights Enforcement at the Border

Customs administrations are in the position to play a pivotal role in enforcing regulations regarding IPR infringing goods, given the fact that trade in such goods often involves cross-border transactions. IPR is one of the key issues discussed in various forums (e.g., WTO, WCO APEC, etc.), and customs administrations worldwide are expected to undertake appropriate measures. This course, consisting of classroom lectures and various field visits, aims to facilitate the students' consideration of a model of IPR border enforcement for their own customs administrations, through study of international practices of IPR border enforcement in Japan. The course also guides students towards a strong understanding of related matters such as individual IPR laws and IP rights holders' activities.






1977 Graduate School of Policy Science (GSPS) established at Saitama University; the predecessor of GRIPS

# 3 Student Support

One unique aspect of GRIPS is our extensive support system for assisting students in their daily living. We consider this aspect of your lives to be every bit as important as your academic life, especially for foreign scholars unfamiliar with Japan. As international students have comprised, on average, about 60% of the GRIPS student body over the last 20 years, we have developed comprehensive services to assist students in their day-to-day living.

It also organizes a number of social events and activities, including field trips and concerts. 

# 4 Admissions



Each year the Secretary General of the WCO invites nominations from a select number of WCO member customs administrations. Although the number of admissions is limited, the program may also admit students who obtain another source of funding (i.e other than WCO scholarships), including scholarships provided by the student's home country.

# **Eligibility Criteria**

Before you apply for GRIPS, please carefully read the full description of eligibility criteria on the Public Finance Program web page at <a href="http://www.grips.ac.jp/en/education/inter\_programs/finance/">http://www.grips.ac.jp/en/education/inter\_programs/finance/</a>. Details of WCO scholarships are also available on that page.

Irrespective of the funding source, to be eligible for admission to the Public Finance Program (Customs Course), the applicant must meet the following criteria:

- 1. Have a bachelor's degree or its equivalent from a recognized, accredited university of the highest standard.
- Be proficient in English (admission priority will be given to applicants who have a TOEFL iBT score of 79 or higher, or an IELTS Academic score of 6.0 or higher).
- 3. Be an active government official in a developing country, with at least 2 years' work experience in customs policy and administration in the home country at the time of enrollment, and preferably below 35 years of age as of April 1st in the year of enrollment. Preference will be given to those who show promise of continuing their career in customs policy and administration upon returning to their home countries.

# For Those Seeking a WCO Scholarship

Those seeking a WCO scholarship must first apply for admission to GRIPS.

GRIPS will make a short list of candidates and send it to the WCO for the final selection.

## Dashgin Aliyev (Azerbaijan, 2009)

Current Position: Regional Development Manager for the WCO Europe region Affiliation: World Customs Organization

Currently I am holding a position of a Regional Development Manager in the WCO Secretariat, in charge of coordination of the capacity building activities and support to the development of Customs Administrations, in the biggest region of the WCO. Back in 2008 I was honored, as a first customs officer from my Customs Administration, to be awarded a scholarship for the Public Finance Programme at GRIPS. The Public Finance Program provides a fantastic opportunity that any customs officers may desire, to develop conceptual understanding and technical competence in Customs and related topics. # Hector Kenzo Horiuti Kitahara (Brazil, 2018)


Current Position: Deputy Director Affiliation: São Paulo Customs
